

Each switch is a personal preference, option, characteristic, situation or dilemma that you need to agree/disagree, want/not want, associate/not associate or believe/not believe in/with.

Each switch is defined and then a context is offered as a way to examine your decision beyond the basis of your own experience.

Your profile will instruct the device in its operations and carry your human authority when interacting with humans or other human-mimicking devices, maintaining your social presence in your absence.

Car Profile - 2000 Land Rover Discovery

Active Cornering Enhancement was standard on the XS and SE models and an option on the others and it genuinely transforms the Discovery from a wallowing barge that at times felt positively life-threatening into a reasonably tidy handler. Whilst it won't be about to show a Subaru Impreza a clean set of exhaust pipes a Series II Discovery fitted with ACE at least removes the need for passenger sick bags during spirited driving. Though cars like the BMW X5 have subsequently moved the 4x4 handling genre forward another few steps, at the time of its launch the Discovery wasn't too far shy of the large 4x4 class leader, the Mercedes M-class.

Car Profile - 1997 Mini Cooper S Works

The wheel-at-each-corner stance gives incredible agility. As with all Minis, the Cooper has a firm ride, bouncing energetically even on smooth surfaces. You're also treated to the familiar whine from the four-speed gearbox and a tuneful exhaust note.

Car Profile - 2018 Toyota Prius 1.8 VVT-I Excel

Despite the fundamental redesign that has gone on under the skin, the car feels familiar on the road: better-handling, and a lot more wieldy and easy to drive than it used to be. It's firmer-riding over bad surfaces, too, but still ultimately laid-back and unimposing. The car's driving experience, while much more precise and responsive than its old standard, remains significantly more isolating and detached than the European hatchback norm. And although that means it's never likely to appeal much to keener drivers, it should allow Toyota to claim some success in moving the car's motive character out of left field without greatly changing it.

Car Profile - 2008 Renault Clio 1.2 TCE Dynamique

We would prefer more feedback through the steering, but the Renault isn't alone in this respect and its brakes are progressive. Remarkably, given its pace, the Clio also proved to be the most frugal model on our test this year. It recorded 41.8mpg, which left all of its rivals in the shade. This is down to the torquey nature of the engine, as we didn't need to work it as hard to keep pace with the other cars. So despite its age, the Renault puts in an excellent showing. It's no longer a trendsetter in the supermini sector, but its high standard specification and low running costs hold plenty of appeal. Factor in one of the best small engines around, and there's life in the Clio yet.

The Volvo V40, is the smallest Volvo for sale in the UK. While the name used to adorn the estate version of the old S40 saloon, the current V40 was launched as an all-new five-door hatchback in 2012. That means it's now one of the longer lived premium hatchbacks on the market, but a competitive price and decent equipment mean it's still worth considering.

Car Profile - The Ghostbusters' Ecto-1 1959 Cadillac Eldorado Miller-Meteor Sentinel(ambulance conversion)

The ambulance/hearse combination was the end loader variety. Dr. Ray Stantz found the vehicle in 1984, shortly after he mortgaged his mother's house to buy the Firehouse. Because of his mechanical skills, he was able to repair the vehicle, which he acquired for \$4,800. After repairs were completed, the vehicle had quite a unique character. It became a well-recognized symbol for the Ghostbusters franchise. The vehicle had enough room in it to store Proton Packs for all of the crew, along with Ecto Goggles, P.K.E. Meters, and a slew of Traps.

Car Profile - Yastava Yugo Innocenti Koral 55

Operate with the belief that others on the road are good drivers?

Do you agree that morality is objective?

There is a discussion around the the quantifiability of moral actions, do you believe this is the case and if so, that machines can do this moral calculation for us.

Technological development in the modern market-economy and anarcho-capitalistic libertarianism is inherently ethically naturalistic. The idea of what is right and wrong is utilitarian, with ethical values being cognitive and factual, situated and virtuous, as opposed to intuitionist, emotivist or prescriptivist - it is natural moral law. If a product succeeds in the market economy, it means it is good, no need to argue, because even though some bullshit might be what is selling the product initially, the bullshit reasoning for the product is justified by the buying of it.
